OUR MISSION

The mission of the Medina County Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health (ADAMH) Board is to assure the availability of high quality alcohol, drug addiction and mental health services to all Medina County residents through planning (assessing needs and resources, and determining priorities); purchasing cost effective services to the extent resources are available; coordinating services; and evaluating these services.

OUR ROLE

The Medina County ADAMH Board's Board of Directors is a public body comprised of up to 14 county citizens appointed to the Board by the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services and the County Commissioners to serve voluntarily. The ADAMH Board provides oversight and direction to multi-faceted, behavioral healthcare community-based programs and services. The ADAMH Board's providers offer treatment, prevention, education, and recovery supports. To do this, the ADAMH Board identifies needs, funds, monitors, and evaluates mental health and substance use disorder services. These services are available to all citizens of Medina County, regardless of their ability to pay.

With input from the community, provider agencies, and stakeholders the ADAMH Board determines the direction of mental health and alcohol and drug treatment services, and contracts for these services through private, non-profit service providers. The ADAMH Board provides full or partial funding to these agencies from federal, state and local funds.

SERVICES PROVIDED BY THE MENTAL HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE NETWORK

Our network of providers is a group of community agencies dedicated to providing effective, coordinated and affordable behavioral health services to the residents of Medina County. Each year, this array of services helps thousands of people struggling with mental health and substance use issues. The agencies provide services for children, adolescents, adults, older adults, and families.

PAYMENT FOR SERVICES

The charge for services at the ADAMH Board's primary agencies is contingent upon how much an individual or family can afford to pay, based on the family income. Payment arrangements are established with the contract agency when services begin. The Medina County ADAMH Board utilizes public funds to share in the cost of services when clients, who are Medina County residents, are unable to afford full payment. Payment is accepted from private insurance, Medicaid, Medicare and other sources first. The ADAMH Board is always the payer of last resort. Individuals are offered the opportunity to enroll in the Board's Sliding Fee for Service plan to ensure that all behavioral health services offered locally are available to them. No one is turned away because of the inability to pay.

MEDINA COUNTY HUMAN SERVICES LEVY

On November 3, 2019, Medina County citizens passed a human services levy which provides approximately \$5 million annually to support the ADAMH Board, Medina County Job and Family Services, and the Medina County Office for Older Adults to secure and increase needed services in Medina County. The three agencies regularly collaborate together and serve many of the same individuals and families, thereby ensuring mutual accountability and maximizing levy dollars. The ADAMH Board is utilizing levy funding to improve available crisis and suicide prevention services, expand recovery housing and peer support programming, and to increase available services.

CORONAVIRUS

During FY2021, the COVID-19 pandemic continued to disrupt behavioral health services and change the landscape of service delivery. At the start of the pandemic in FY2020, with Governor DeWine's stay at home orders and social distancing requirements, agency revenue quickly declined as individuals in need of services cancelled or did not show up for needed appointments. The ADAMH Board provider agencies quickly shifted from face-to-face service delivery to a Telehealth platform (telephonic/video), which enabled the continuation of much needed behavioral health services and a pathway for agencies to remain solvent. Throughout FY2021, ADAMH Board agencies primarily provided Telehealth services; with staff working remotely and building up competence in an entirely new way of providing services. Towards the end of FY2021, COVID-19 restrictions began to lessen, though the pandemic continues with new variants and continued social distancing. Agency providers have primarily moved back into a face-to-face model of services, however Telehealth options remain, and for some this has become the preferred modality of treatment. COVID-19 has left a lasting impact on the delivery of behavioral health services.

WORKFORCE

FY2020 and FY2021 brought unprecedented workforce challenges across the nation, and the community-based behavioral health field was no exception to this. In 2019, the ADAMH Board had preemptively started to work with provider agencies to address workforce concerns looming on the horizon, however the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic accelerated this dilemma. There were already concerns about a national shortage of those currently in the behavioral health workforce, along with a decrease of those entering the behavioral health field. However, nothing could have prepared the ADAMH Board agencies for the pandemic in FY2020, which brought with it a marked increase in need for behavioral health services along with staff shortages. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, many behavioral health professionals decided they no longer wanted to work in close contact with individuals, and others decided to retire early, stop working to stay home with their family, or relocate to be closer to relatives. Additionally, the implementation of numerous Telehealth agencies and the addition of behavioral health services to several area hospitals allowed clinicians the ability to select positions from higher paying organizations, often with the ability to work remotely. The ADAMH Board continued to work closely with provider agencies throughout FY2021; discussing recruitment and retention strategies.

ADAMH FUNDED ORGANIZATIONS AND PROGRAMS

Alternative Paths and OhioGuidestone were the largest community-based behavioral health agencies funded by the ADAMH Board in FY2021. Their mix of services provided Medina County residents with a choice of providers that offered local behavioral health (mental health and substance use disorder) services as well as access to a full continuum of care through partnerships with neighboring counties. During FY2021, the ADAMH Board continued to provide funding to Hope Recovery Community (HRC) to provide peer and recovery support services throughout Medina County. The Medina County ADAMH Board also funds numerous other initiatives in Medina County, which range from early childhood services, recovery supports, permanent supportive housing, and school prevention, all the way through senior programming, to assure a comprehensive array of services for residents.

Alternative Paths, Inc. is a not-for-profit provider of community-based behavioral health services. While their main campus is located in Medina, they have satellite offices in Lodi and Wadsworth. Alternative Paths is the County's agency for providing 24/7 crisis services to residents. This agency has traditionally specialized in treatment for adults and youth experiencing severe and persistent mental illnesses such as schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, major depression, and other psychotic and personality disorders. However, over the last several years Alternative Paths expanded their array of services in numerous arenas. They began to incorporate a full range of services for substance use disorders, including individual and group counseling, and a Medication-Assisted Treatment program. They also expanded treatment for youth with Severe Emotional Disturbances (SED) and child psychiatry services, and became the gatekeeper for inpatient treatment for high-risk youth involved with multiple agencies through the County's Service Coordination and ICAT programs. In FY2019, their 24-hour Crisis Line was expanded and rebranded as the 24/7 Crisis and Behavioral Health Helpline. In FY2020, they continued to expand crisis services by hiring an Access & Engagement Liaison to triage crisis calls and expedite linkage to the appropriate treatment or service, and also initiated a Caring Contact Collaboration with Akron Children's Hospital. In FY2021, Alternative Paths collaborated with Hope Recovery Community to offer peer support at the Medina County Jail and through the 24/7 Crisis & Behavioral Health Helpline. Overall, in FY2021 Alternative Paths served 5,798 unique, unduplicated clients. They continue to provide robust suicide prevention, alcohol and other drug, and gambling prevention services; participating in 340 prevention activities in FY2021. Alternative Paths also continues to provide vocational programming, and in FY2021, staff assisted with 146 job applications, 62 interviews and 26 job placements. Looking ahead to FY2022, Alternative Paths is moving forward with a new CEO, Ms. Nikole Hosking.

Alternative Paths is comprised of a multi-disciplinary team consisting of psychologists, psychiatrists, nurses, counselors, social workers, case managers, and community supportive psychiatric treatment professionals who work collaboratively to develop a plan of care appropriate to the needs of each client they serve. Fees for services are based on an individual’s financial resources. A sliding fee scale incorporating family size and income is applied for residents of Medina County. No one is denied services provided by Alternative Paths because of inability to pay. Alternative Paths accepts private insurance, Medicare, and Medicaid.

OhioGuidestone is a full service, not-for-profit, comprehensive, community-based outpatient behavioral healthcare organization that was a new contract agency for the ADAMH Board in FY2018. Fiscal Year 2021 was a continued year of growth and implementation for OhioGuidestone who has become an outstanding partner in Medina County. OhioGuidestone provides mental health and substance use disorder services for children, adolescents, and adults of all ages. The professional staff at OhioGuidestone are comprised of psychologists, psychiatrists, social workers, counselors, case managers, peer supporters, prevention staff and community supportive psychiatric treatment professionals who are there to help those seeking assistance in dealing with individual or familial concerns related to mental health, psychiatric, relational or substance use problems. OhioGuidestone has worked hard to implement necessary services and meet the behavioral health concerns of individuals, families and communities in Medina County. In FY2021, they served 1,272 individuals with mental health and substance use needs. Towards the end of FY2018, OhioGuidestone began to implement a Peer Support

Network of services, which has built up over the years and become a thriving program that provides support to many. In FY2021, OhioGuidestone employed 12 certified peer supporters who served 477 individuals. OhioGuidestone implemented a Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) walk-in clinic and added a third Intensive Outpatient group to its service array in FY2019. In FY2021, the MAT walk-in clinic has served 81 unduplicated individuals. Also in FY2021, OhioGuidestone moved forward with managing the ADAMH Board’s 12-bed women’s Discovery Recovery House, which opened in June 2021. OhioGuidestone oversees the facility and provides clinical services for the women residing there. OhioGuidestone services are offered in an office setting, the community, or in a client’s home, thereby reaching people in outlying communities. OhioGuidestone services are offered to Medina County residents on a sliding fee scale, according to a person’s ability to pay. No one is denied services provided by OhioGuidestone because of inability to pay. OhioGuidestone accepts private insurance, Medicaid, as well as Medicare.

HOPE RECOVERY COMMUNITY

In February of 2018, the ADAMH Board established a Recovery Support Systems (RSS) Ad Hoc Committee to review and work towards providing recovery supports in Medina County. The RSS Committee led to the ADAMH Board supporting the hiring of a Peer Recovery Coordinator and the expansion of Peer Recovery Support services through OhioGuidestone. The Peer Support Coordinator, along with support from the recovery community initiated a 501(c)3 by the name of Hope Recovery Community (HRC). HRC was created with the intent of providing peer support and recovery support services county-wide. The ADAMH Board listened to members of the recovery community and worked hard to put an initiative in place that would benefit them. The ADAMH Board sought and received a state capital grant to purchase and renovate a home on Highland Drive in the city of Medina that would become a county-wide Peer Recovery Support Network and Hub. This house became the home of Hope Recovery Community (HRC) who operates as a Recovery Community Organization (RCO). HRC opened their doors in October 2019 and have already established themselves as a leader in multiple recovery pathways in Ohio.

The location of Hope Recovery Community is on a campus-like setting. Within walking distance, there are two community-based behavioral health agencies providing outpatient treatment services such as diagnostic assessment, group and individual counseling, as well as Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT) and crisis services. Also located nearby are Medina Metropolitan Housing Authority (MMHA), Medina County Job & Family Services, Community Action Wayne and Medina, the Veteran’s Administration, the ADAMH Board’s new women’s Discovery Recovery House, and a plethora of businesses and employment opportunities. This setting allows individuals easy access to treatment and recovery supports.

Hope Recovery Community has worked hard to partner with the community, while always putting the needs of those they serve at the forefront. The ADAMH Board has provided operational funding for HRC, as well as the physical site for their Medina location. Other partners include ADAMH Board provider agencies; such as OhioGuidestone and Alternative Paths, and non-ADAMH funded agencies such as Bellefaire and LCADA Way. HRC works closely with Cathy’s House and also has a major role in the ADAMH Board’s Discovery Recovery House facility that opened in June. HRC works with the Medina County Probation Departments, Medina County Job and Family Services, and the Medina County Health Department. They work with Community

Assessment & Treatment Services in Medina County, as well as numerous other residential and detox facilities across Ohio. In a very short time, HRC has become an important and highly regarded part of the Medina community.
